





Major Efforts For May - Continuing Development Of The Playground At The Hall.

Bywong Car Boot Sale: The 20th anniversary CBS was very successful and funds for the BCA were raised from stall holders, the raffle and the sale of our custom tea towels (see further below).

Other community groups also benefit from the event including -

The RFS from donations at the gate and income from their hot food stall;

Landcare from sale of their plants;

The Geary's Gap Pony Club from their Devonshire tea stall.

The Bungendore Scouts who will receive a donation for their efforts in selling our raffle tickets.

This year the committee decided to hold back some of the CBS revenue for other contingencies. It was considered that to give back to our community we hold other events which we can fund directly without appealing for external donations. For example the playground opening could be funded this way.

Tea Towels Have Been Made Great Again (very bigly): As reported previously John-Pierre Favre (current treasurer of BCA) has done a series of very good and honest sketches of a large number of historical buildings in Bungendore, Braidwood, Queanbeyan and Goulburn. The sketches for each town are being reproduced on printed tea towels at JP's expense, and are being sold as a general fund raiser for the BCA (although the Goulburn set has not been printed yet). JP is of course reimbursed for his production and marketing expenses but all profits accrue to the BCA. This is a really great boost to our funding, and sale of the Queanbeyan towels has already allowed the BCA to make a significant (four figure) contribution to the Carwoola Fire Appeal. This was presented to the Appeal administrator (Mr. Tim Overall) last Monday. The Queanbeyan towels have actually completely sold out and another batch is being produced.

Tea towels for Bungendore, Braidwood and –when newly available – Queanbeyan are being sold at Food Lovers and the Bendigo Bank in Bungendore. The profit for these sales will go towards the playground project.

JP is to be commended for this effort as are Merle and others who have packaged and actively marketed these products. They are well worth buying for personal use or as gifts. A colourful card showing flora and fauna of our area is also being printed and will be sold by the Bungendore Post Office. Hopefully, this card will last for many years and keep selling to raise fund for the BCA.

Playground Project; The playground is a major project, this year and we have contributed some of the CBS proceeds to this effort, and profit from tea towel sales is also expected to be a significant revenue source for the project.

Construction has begun on necessary infrastructure for the playground and we expect to see new steps and edging along with additional paving in place at the front of the hall by the end of the month.

The Passing of Guy Cotsell; It is with great sadness that we farewell Guy Cotsell who died on the 24th April after a long illness. During his time in Bywong, Guy was an active community member and we all benefited from his work. He was instrumental in surveying the community for its locality name – Bywong.

Guy was very active in the Community Association and several other local committees, and for many years he wrote and was responsible for this regular BCA contribution to the Whisper.

The BCA extends sincere sympathy to Guy's wife Morag, and he will be very much missed.

New Web Site; Development of our new website is underway and it should be up and running soon. It will have a simpler design and be more intuitive to use. We'll welcome your feedback

CANBERRA Equine HOSPITAL

Normal vital signs for adult horses (at rest):

- -Heart rate 32 44 beats per minute
- -Rectal temperature approximately 37 38.5°C
- -Respiratory (breathing) rate 12 24 breaths per minute
- -Gums should be light pink & moist with capillaryrefill time less than 2 secs
- -Sounds of the intestines should be heard on both sides of the abdomen
- -6-10 manures and 3-4 urinations should be passed every 24 hours
- -A 500kg thoroughbred-sized horse drinks 20-25 litres every 24 hours **How to find your horse's vital signs:**

Your horse should always be safely restrained while taking vital signs. Some horses may become fidgety during parts of this examination, so extra care should be taken. Learn your horse's normal vital signs when at

rest and after exercise to know when they are feeling off.

Heart Rate (HR): Place the flat side of the stethoscope head behind your horse's left elbow, in front of where your girth would sit. Count each "lubdub" sound as one beat.

Temperature: Lubricate your thermometer (eg. with KY Jelly). Stand safely to the side of your horse's rump. Gently but firmly hold the tail at the base, and lift it to one side. Insert the thermometer into the anus, holding it firmly flat against the wall of the rectum. When the thermometer indicates it has finished reading, remove it and record the reading.

Respiratory Rate (RR): Watch your horse's flank and rib cage rise and fall as he/she breathes. Count each inhalation (breathe in) and exhalation (breathe out) together as one breath. You can also listen for the respiratory

rate with your stethoscope, or watch the flare of the nostrils.

Oral Mucous Membranes: Lift your horse's lips to show the gums – what colour are they? If they are any shade of purple, blue or red, call us urgently. Feel the gums with your finger tip – do they feel moist, or dry? Press your finger firmly against the gum, then release. Watch to see how long the gum colour takes to return to normal. This is known as the capillary refill time (CRT).

Abdominal Sounds: Listen with the stethoscope on each side of your horse's abdomen, above and below the flank area. The sounds you hear will vary, and can be described as gurgling, rumbling, tinkling etc. Sounds will vary in frequency and loudness, depending on which area you listen to. You should always be able to hear sounds in all quarters if using a stethoscope.

<u>Remember</u>: If you are concerned about your horse at any time of the day or night, we have our team of dedicated equine vets and nurses on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Do you know your horse's normal vital signs? Vital signs include your horse's resting heart rate, breathing rate and temperature. A variation in your horse's vital signs can indicate he or she is suffering pain or disease.

If your horse seems unwell or appears to have unusual behaviour, it's always helpful to perform a quick vital signs check.

Wildcare Snake Reporting

With the cooler months upon us, Wildcare's snake handler volunteers can look forward to a well-earned rest. This year Wildcare attended a large number of callouts across the region and gave telephone advice to many more people who were

troubled by our venomous friends. It's important to realize that snakes are shy animals and are more fearful of us than the other way around. Like all native animals they are protected by Law and shouldn't be harmed unnecessarily.

Wayne, who has been Wildcare's snake coordinator for several years, commented, "It has been a very interesting snake season. In November and December we ran our well-known and oversubscribed snake rescue course. We aim to get all snake handler volunteers to complete a refresher course to keep them current and motivated; there is also a need to train new volunteers; and this year the focus was on more rescuers in the North/West of the ACT. We trained and refreshed 70 volunteers, including a group of keepers from the National Zoo and Aquarium. We now have 10 people covering Hall, Gundaroo, Sutton, Murrumbateman and Yass, with 79 other rescuers covering Queanbeyan, Bungendore



"Prior to the training course, we collect snakes from all around. One big brown snake (see photo) from Fernleigh Park had some serious attitude, which caused even our most senior trainers to give a moment of pause in handling.

"This year, as well as the usual callouts to remove snakes from houses, sheds, bird netting and pathways, we had two instances of snakes caught in humane mouse traps – essentially a steel box with a one way door. The snake goes in to investigate a trapped mouse; gets a free dinner; but is then trapped. One brown was successfully released, the other, not so lucky. He was in extremely poor condition and could have been in the trap for several weeks during the hot stretch of 40degree days. Dehydrated, shedding, and generally not happy. I took him into care to rehydrate. I was pleased to see him gobble up a mouse I offered after just a few days. Unfortunately, two days later, I found him dead with the mouse regurgitated. It's impossible to know what happened, but I think he may have been too over heated in the mouse trap, and he couldn't cope."

Here are Wildcare's top tips for autumn to avoid being surprised:

- Clear up your property of loose piles of debris that look inviting, as a wintering place for snakes,
- Turn over compost heaps, keeping them well aerated and less of a target for mice to setup a nest,
- Get bird netting off the ground perhaps install mouse mesh around the base of things you want to protect, with netting draped higher up. This way you can still protect your fruit/vegies, but won't trap lizards and snakes.



Seasonal Outlook

Drier May to July likely for southern two-thirds of Australia (Bureau of Meteorology)

- May to July rainfall likely to be below average over the southern two-thirds of mainland Australia. Chances of a drier
 three months are highest in southeast Australia, where there is a greater than 75% chance that the season will be below
 average.
- May is likely to be drier than average across most of Australia, except far northern Australia and Tasmania. This outlook is influenced by warming in tropical Pacific sea surface temperatures and a cooler eastern Indian Ocean.
- Historical outlook accuracy for May to July is moderate over most of eastern Australia and WA, but is lower in patches across the central south, and the tropical north.

Crews attended two separate motor vehicle accidents (MVAs) on Shingle Hill Way and Macs Reef Road, Bywong. Only one call-out related to a fire but it was a false alarm.

The Brigade's training sessions have focussed on moving quickly and efficiently through pumping and drafting activities, concentrating on minimising duplication of efforts that is often a cause for crewmembers fatiguing faster. Coming up next month on 13th June is the AGM at the Fire Station at 7.30.

A special thanks to Philip Leeson and Colleen Fogarty who, between them, have offered to take on mailboxing the 26 Whispers for Norton Road between Campbell Place and Bingley Way. Penny and Don Evans delivered these for years.

It costs \$2 to mail a complimentary copy of the Whisper to each "out of area" advertiser. Because they pay, month after month, the Whisper printing costs, this is a welcome task. At present, the Whisper, if it is 28 pages and 1,314 copies, costs exactly \$1 per printed issue. Our invaluable and generous advertisers, collectively and on average, pay in each month around \$1,400 or \$1,500.

Any surplus over printing goes to the Wamboin Community Association . The WCA deliberately sets the price for advertisements at just over printing costs, because printing needs to be paid for. Another goal of the Whisper ads, though, is providing a reasonably affordable way for locally based businesses and out of area businesses to gain trade with Wamboin and Bywong customers.

An occasional activity by those who attend the monthly WCA meetings is to approve use of any surplus funds from Whisper advertising. Over the years these meetings have voted to contribute money to many things they judge will benefit the community. A few examples are contributing to fire brigade projects and to hall management projects, helping to pay for the playground shadecloth and donating \$1,000 to the Carwoola Commity Association to use at its discretion to help those recovering from the fire.

You can probably see that the 50 or so deliverers below, by walking, running, cycling or driving to each of our mailboxes, along with its advertisers and its contributors, are a key guarantee for the Whisper's existence. Australia Post would charge \$2 x around 1,280 mailboxes, and any other deliverer would probably want a similar amount. Finding that money month after month would be tough.



Nature Notes April 2017 by Jo Walker

Although there wasn't enough rain to get the creeks running and the rather low dams topped up, there was enough (about 32 mm here) to keep the grasses growing well. Even my dry and rocky hillside is still green. And we've just had the first frost for the season. A very light one though – just a dusting of white here and there.

Not much is flowering at the moment – just a few of the native Small St. John's Wort (*Hypericum gramineum*) and one or two Bluebells (*Wahlenbergia communis*). The Silver Wattles (*Acacia dealbata*) should look good in spring as they are heavily covered in buds this year – and some of them are already showing a bit of colour. The leafy rosettes of the Scaly Buttons (*Leptorhynchos squamatus*) are growing fast into robust little plants in the soakage areas, and the leaves of the Billy Buttons (*Craspedia varia*), another moisture-loving daisy, are making an appearance too.

The Powerful Owl that inhabited Poppet Road for a while a year or two ago may be back in the area. Last week, I found the large fluffy tail of a Glider under a large tree in the driveway. The Wedge-tailed Eagles have glided over a few times this month too. The family of White-winged Choughs seems to have decided to stay here and they're busy turning over the leaf litter – and the garden – looking for food. Although most of the Dusky Wood-swallows set off on a migration to warmer areas last month, a few seem to have stayed.

A male Mistletoe-bird was feeding in one of the many mistletoes here recently. We have two common mistletoes locally, *Amyema pendulum* and *A. miquellii* – the former being the more common one in Wamboin. There are many other different species of mistletoes on a variety of host plants throughout the whole country which probably accounts for the wide distribution of this beautiful little bird. It is brightly coloured – its back and head are black, the upper chest bright red and the lower chest white with a central black vertical stripe. That's the male – the female is much less noticeable, mostly grey and white with just a patch of reddish feathers below the tail.

There are still a few Grass Skinks out and about, mostly tiny young ones. And I did see a rather large Shingleback Lizard recently, sunning itself beside the track at the top of the hill and showing no inclination to move away from its warm spot as I approached. The Cunningham's Skinks seem to have taken shelter in their logs for the winter.

And, judging by the smoke rising from a few chimneys across the landscape in the evenings, some of the other inhabitants of Wamboin are beginning to feel the same way.

Date of Meeting: 18 April 2017 Meeting chaired by: Peter Evans, Acting President, WCA

General Outline Of Topics Discussed

Another well attended and productive meeting of the WCA, held back-to-back with the 2017 AGM, heard brief reports from members of the WCA Committee and from representatives of other community organisations active in our community and associated, in some manner with the WCA. Treasurer Keith France indicated that the Association has now received the funds from the Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council (QPRC) covering our successful grant applications. 

They obviously hadn't got their forecast, this time, from the BOM! Two sulphur crested cockatoos have warmed my heart. When they're not working with the steady hollow tap tap sound on their house renovations in an old grey tree trunk, they're on the verandah rails, preening each other, wrapped in the glow of young love. If only they'd coo, like story book lovers, and not squawk!!

And so to the melancholy call, not of birds, but ANZAC Day bagpipes. We went to the Queanbeyan Dawn Service once again, driving through the dark, eyes on stalks, ever alert for a kangaroo or three claiming their rights that they were here first.
