

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
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
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President's Notes



We are into 2024 with a rush I'm pleased to say.



Farm Fire Units





The NSW RFS recognises and values that in many parts of the state, our NSW RFS resources are supported by the use of private equipment, including Farm Fire Units (FFUs), to fight and contain fires. Safety at fires is everyone's responsibility, and the NSW RFS is committed to working with property owners and community members to ensure we can manage fire together in a safe and coordinated way.

Safety

Safety at fires is the number one priority of the NSW RFS, and must also be yours. If you are preparing to fight fire or attend the fire ground, you need to take responsibility for your own safety and the safety of any persons for whom you have responsibility under the WHS legislation. This responsibility doesn't just cover your activity while physically fighting a fire, but extends well before it to your preparation and planning. **Preparation** The decision to engage in firefighting should be carefully considered and planned well before an actual outbreak of fire. It is essential that FFU operators are adequately prepared by: having the appropriate skills and knowledge being mentally and physically prepared understanding the risks involved accepting responsibility for decisions and actions having

suitable PPE liaising with their local NSW RFS brigade. You can use the "IMSAFER" checklist to consider if you are physically prepared to fight a fire. You will also need to prepare your equipment and vehicle/s to make sure they will operate as intended. The best time to do this is prior to the bush fire danger period beginning in your area. Equipment preparation includes: compliance with any relevant legislation, including not driving unregistered vehicles on public roads ensuring your vehicle is not overloaded ensuring load and fittings are properly secured ensuring your vehicle and equipment is mechanically sound and reliable ensuring your vehicle has precautions in case of fire overrun equipping your vehicle with UHF communications, a portable handheld UHF radio and amber beacon. It is also the duty of an owner or occupier of land to prepare their property for fire. There are many practical steps you can take to prevent the occurrence of bush fires and minimise the spread and associated dangers of bush fires on your land. To find out about the bush fire risks in your area and the prescribed strategies for dealing with them, you should read your local Bush Fire Risk Management Plan. You can find a copy of the plan at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare/managingbush-fire-risk/bush-firemanagement-committees or by contacting your local Fire Control Centre. You can also download the NSW RFS Farm Fire Plan at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/planand-prepare/farm-fire-safety to help manage fire risks on your land.




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Wamboin Communications Action Group

Below is an update on the WCAG originated project. WCAG has continued to keep government focused on the importance of the project to the community and ongoing problems with Communications Providers across the community. This has included the recent spike in residents being advised by the Internet Service Providers that their ADSL service is to be disconnected. WCAG has raised these concerns with the Department of Regional NSW and we briefed the February 2024 WCA meeting on the Department's response. Opticomm subsequently provided the statement below to the Whisper which expanded on the Department's advice.

Friday 23 February 2024

We're writing to provide you with an update regarding Opticomm's Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) network rollout in Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton, With thanks to funding from the NSW Government's Regional Digital Connectivity program, this project will potentially connect over 1,400 addresses within these communities to superfast fibre broadband.

Opticomm remains committed to delivering this rollout, which will be one of the largest digital infrastructure rollouts for the Monaro and Yass Valley regions to date. Since commencing this project, we have already made significant progress across the planning, design and build phases.

As you may be aware, the network rollout is temporarily paused because one of the construction partners working on the network build entered into financial administration unexpectedly at the end of 2023.

We appreciate the importance of this project for Wamboin, Bywong and Sutton residents and we are working to resolve this short-term challenge, as soon as practicable.

We have a formal tender process underway to appoint a specialist delivery partner, who can deploy the FTTP network in this region. We will provide further updates about this process, and when you can expect works to recommence, as soon as possible.

When the project resumes, we will continue to build the network throughout Sutton and into Wamboin and Bywong, with the majority of the street network already completed in Sutton.



A Visit – by James Houlcroft

Highly Commended Entrant in the Short Story Contest

I was out for a morning walk, when out of nowhere they arrived. The small strange craft buzzed softly like a wasp caught in the folds of a rarely opened curtain, mute but distantly angry with a potential for violence as yet unknown. Shaped vaguely like a knitting needle pushed through a pomegranate, their craft landed upright in the middle of the path that snaked through the greenway, startling both myself and a pair of crimson rosellas preening themselves in a nearby tree. I felt strangely serene as, with a hiss and a soft pop, the passengers emerged. They looked like misshapen croquembouches and they quickly surrounded me. With compound eyes glittering, they began gesturing at me to enter the ship with their numerous thin, ribbonlike arms, while others scattered and began taking cuttings of dogwood, black wattle and brittle gum saplings using unfamiliar apparatus that sung angelically as they sliced off leavings of kangaroos with small hoots of delight and sudden convulsions that rippled through their lumpy torsos. I almost called out to them to take only photos and leave only footprints, but I couldn't see any ears and was being prodded forward towards the teetering ship so decided it was best to just leave it.

As they cajoled me forward towards that ship I distinctly remember asking "Why me?" as if there was ever a chance it wouldn't be me. I'm a lightening rod for events like this. Just last week a sinkhole to a subterranean world opened up in my backyard taking my brand new mower, the second-hand trampoline my wife scored off the Buy Nothing group and my eldest daughter. Each of them lost in those vast and time-forgotten prehistoric depths. Earlier this year, could have been April or May, I had to call Council to report that Bigfoot was back again, sitting on roof, picking his toenails with a bent star picket. The lady on the other end of the phone, when she eventually answered, asked if I'd completed the Application for Sasquatch Habitation, available online and, when I told them that the website was confusing and I couldn't find it, she laughed derisively and knowingly before asking for a payment of \$330. I quickly hung up and ignored all calls for the rest of the day.

A I trudged up the lolling tongue of the craft, the floor underfoot was warm and slightly malleable. My boot prints appeared as physical indentations that slowly healed over as I moved forward. Once inside, I looked around and watched as the remaining flock of visitors filed in behind me carrying their samples, scattering quickly towards various rooms that opened up awaiting them, revealing countless pens with various animals and assorted plant life. In one room I swore I caught a glimpse of a single canoe, dusty and dirty and covered with deep gouges, propped up against a wall to the back.

I was ushered into a space that reminded me of my doctor's office but as I practiced my cough and prepared to drop my trousers, the room began to thrum as a cone lowered from the ceiling, twitching lightly. One of my hosts reached upwards and began to guide it towards me as another crooned in my ear. "Ahhhh, so this was their game", I thought. "I've been around the block long enough to know when someone is trying to copy my memories." The Government tried that in '07 in a misguided door-knocking campaign and more recently the guy who looks after my daughter's horse when we head to the Coast tried to talk me into trading all my memories from 1996 to 1999 for a second hand bridle. I didn't know this new mob's end goal but I figured they had been polite enough so far so I'd go along with them for a bit.

The whole process took about a month and a half from my rough estimate. During this time, my new friends took me on a small sightseeing tour around the planets and fed me some rather interesting meals. I won't lie, snacking on Unicorn jerky while watching the ring rise over Saturn sure beats microwaving last night's leftovers, but it didn't quite have the same feel as a Lamb Pie from Gunna Do. Eventually the duplication process began to wrap up and it was time to get back to life back on earth. However, despite what I felt were very clear instructions, once we returned to Earth, the ship set down on the other side of the rise behind the

Macs Reef Waste Transfer Station. Four of them pushed me out, those ribbonlike arms flapping against my back like wet seaweed in rough surf, while the other cried what I could only imagine was good riddance out of the thick crystalline windows. Then, with a soft snap of a bubble bursting, they took off, leaving me alone again. As I climbed the rise, the familiar sounds of cars tailgating each other on Macs Reef Road rose up to meet me, and I wondered if the dragon that hoards old milk cartons and squashed cardboard boxes was awake, as he owed me money from last month's poker game. When I found his den empty, I assumed he must be visiting family overseas as he often does, and grudged out to the toad and crossed it, avoiding a pothole and stepping over the twisted body of the first of many road kill kangaroos. Then I began the long walk back into town.





Our Experience with Putting Power Back into the Grid

I read in the Whisper that some people are having issues with not being able to put power back into the grid due to high supply voltages. We went through this some years ago and forced the energy company to comply with the Australian Standards for low voltage domestic supply. The applicable standard is AS 60038 2000, which changed the supply voltage point from 240v/415v 3-phase to 230v/400 3-phase. It also specifies the tolerance that must be met by all suppliers and in our case +10/-6%, which gives a single phase voltage of 216.2v min and 253v max. These should be measured at the power board on the main dwelling. There is also a time limit to the length of time that the power can vary from that.

Also of interest is another standard introduced in 2016, AS 4777.2, which set the maximum output voltage, (i.e. from your inverter to the grid), at the main power board, of 255v. So if the voltage a the power board goes over 255v the inverter will stop inverting. In our case the power at the power board was 253-256v all the time. It now runs between 235-241v after they changed the tapping on the transformer on the Norton Road power pole opposite our property.

I have included links to this information if the readers are interested. The power companies want to see as little power put back in to the grid as possible so they can charge for the power consumed. However, they do have to stay legal and most of them seem to be hoping the residents are ignorant of the fact that there are regulations about supply that have to be abided by.

The supply voltage is not only of interest to those with solar. Every consumer has electrical appliances which are built to operate with the standard supply voltage. It would be interesting to see the response from the power companies to a domestic fire caused by electrical equipment that was subject to higher than standard voltage. One would suspect that they would become liable for causing the fire and subsequent damage, but proving it may be difficult.

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

Playgroup volunteers and coordinators, hall management, and the Wamboin Community Association acted immediately to empty the shed and escalate this community issue. The QRPC was informed, who quickly carried more complex testing on the playshed and its surroundings. It was discovered through these tests that the traces were below 1%, and subsequently not a health and safety risk requiring a soil analysis. With this information, a team was organized by council to pressure wash the playshed inside and out, and afterwards a deep clean in and around the shed area was led by Denise, who moved all toys, craft supplies and play equipment back. Playgroup has reached out council for a timeline on when the playshed will be repainted...and have (jokingly) requested rainbow or zebra print. Playgroup would like to acknowledge and thank all involved in addressing this community issue, especially hall management, who graciously made space in their storage area for playgroup to use until the playshed was stripped.

Besides the playshed excitement, playgroup is giddy to report record attendances of children and carers coming to our free play sessions. Nearly twenty children and babies joined in our Christmas party fun, where ornaments were painted, and a veritable feast of fruits and baked goods were served up for all. Playgroup is a wonderful place to bond and create memories that last a lifetime! Come be a part of this weekly opportunity for our kids to head outside and get some fresh air, sun and socialisation.

What the Heck Chapter 21

Quite a few chapters back we mentioned the pews at St Peters and how they were modified by Russ Ferrett to be a more comfortable seat for the congregation. Like others, Russ and Margaret found them most uncomfortable for sitting through a service,



even if it was only for about one hour. Yet for sixty years or so, people had persisted so as to be able to attend the twice monthly service. The existing pews were approximately 28 centimetres deep, which is not much less than today's chairs which are around 35 centimetres. But whereas today's chairs have either a moulded or slanted back, the pew backs were straight up and down with a wooden rail support. This would have meant being unable to sit right back on the seat to use the 28 centimetres of leg support. The size of one's posterior would have controlled the amount of leg able to fit on the seat. Even the thought of it causes discomfort. A hard wooden base seat for one's buttocks with a hard wooden back rail biting into one's back below the shoulder blade!

Russ decided he would bring the congregation of St Peters into the modern world! With the (probably unanimous) approval of the congregation, he set to work modifying the ancient pews.

First he removed the back rail. Then he added timber to both the front and back of the seat. This increased the depth to around 35 cm, and created a pocket to accept a cushion. Next were new end pieces which sloped back around 25 degrees and were joined by a new back rail some 8 cm higher than the original. All this timber was chamfered and moulded to increase the comfort, particularly when the

cushions, made by the ladies, were inserted into the pockets. Drop in one day and see his handiwork. Thanks Russ. – **byAlan Rope**

Bird Of The Month

For March I chose the Royal Spoonbill, a wetland bird that is scarce in Wamboin, but which I saw flying over recently. **Royal Spoonbill** (*Platalea regia*)

Size:74-80cm. Status: Rare visitor

The Royal Spoonbill is a large all-white waterbird, with a contrasting and distinctive huge black spoon-shaped bill and black legs. The black bill extends onto the face, with a small yellow eyebrow and red forehead, which become more pronounced in breeding plumage, during which time they also develop their "royal" attire, consisting of a large tuft of long plumes on the back of the head. Their bill shape is a unique adaptation of Spoonbills, which forage in shallow water for prey such as fish and other aquatic invertebrates. They "spoon" their bill, slightly open, through the water, and snap up anything that is disturbed by this motion. Therefore, Royal Spoonbills are always seen around water, particularly shallower edges of wetlands, lakes or dams. They are often nomadic, wandering in response to rain. Since there is not much wetland habitat in Wamboin, it is unusual to see one here, so I was pleasantly surprised to spot one flying over while driving along Macs Reef Road recently. I imagine it was passing through between suitable bodies of water. Whilst a rare sight in Wamboin, there are actually a fair few Royal Spoonbills currently around Lake George, which is very full at the moment. A good spot to see them is the rest areas on the highway past the lake, or sometimes they can even



be spotted from the window while driving. Here there are also many of the similar Yellow-billed Spoonbill, which differ in having a yellow bill and legs. Royal Spoonbills are usually easy to identify, though sometimes they sleep by standing with their head tucked into their feathers, at which time they can be confused with an Egret or White Ibis, however note the black legs, and often the posture and thickness of the neck can separate them. Spoonbills, like ibises, lack a voicebox, so only give an occasional alarmed grunt if disturbed. Royal Spoonbills are a very striking and unusual bird and I always enjoy seeing them around, as it is not a regular occasion. Whilst your chance might be low in Wamboin, you may have better luck to encounter one along Lake George. (Photo from Google images)





Nature Notes - February 2024

Although autumn is just a week away, the grass is still green and the eucalypts and wattles are still putting on new growth of various colours – producing a tapestry of many shades of green across the local countryside. Most of the grasses are seeding at the moment, making it obvious how many different species of native grasses we have here. After the fairly consistent rainfall during summer, the Weeping Grass (*Microlaena stipoides*) is doing particularly well. It grows in moist areas and probably gets its name from the long drooping seed-heads.

There are still a few flowers providing a bit of colour. The Sticky Everlasting Daisy (*Xerochrysum viscosum*) has one of the longest flowering seasons and is still bearing golden papery flowers -and the tiny yellow button flowers of the ground-hugging Common Everlasting Daisy (*Chrysocephalum apiculatum*) are still evident amongst its greyish foliage. Another ground-cover, *Goodenia hederacea* (Ivy Goodenia), also has a few yellow flowers still showing. And, amongst the grasses, the native Small St. John'sWort (*Hypericum gramineum*) is carrying a few tiny yellow flowers on slender stems. The Bluebells, *Wahlenbergia stricta* and *W. communis*, have almost finished flowering, but are still adding a few spots of blue.

I mentioned the Slender Mint (*Mentha diemenica*) last month and described it as growing to 15 cm tall – quoting from one of the books on local flora and also from my own observations as most of those growing here are less than that. But today I found a patch of the Mint growing by the side of the creek close to a thicket of Tall Sedges (*Carex appressa*). Several of the Mint stems had grown up through the foliage of the tall tussocks and were about 40 cm tall. So, their height depends on where they're growing!

There was a small flock of Red-browed Finches, ten or so, here recently. I hadn't seen them for a while. And a family of Choughs has returned after a long absence. And, just as I sat down to write this, two Wedge-tailed Eagles soared over the hill opposite and drifted around high in the sky for a while before taking off in different directions. The Eagles were seen here fairly regularly once, but they probably find it difficult to spot prey as the vegetation has increased and spend their time over more open country now.

There are still a few Painted Lady butterflies (*Vanessa kershawi*) flitting around during the day, but stll a dearth of moths after dark. It's a long time since I've seen the micro-bats at dusk or have heard a Boobook Owl. But, I did find a passalid beetle (*Mastachilus australasicus*) on the verandah recently. They are shiny, dark brown beetles about three centimetres long and are described as living in small colonies of adults and larvae in rotting wood. There were plenty of them around many years ago, but I hadn't seen one for a long time. They are one of the insects able to vocalise, emitting a loud squeaky creaking noise when disturbed. Nice to know they're still around in Wamboin.



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Kowen Kapers - Kowen Homestead By Peter Komidar

The Old Homestead Picnic Ground is situated on the site of the McInnes family home, called Kowen Homestead, which dates back to the 1860s.

From a modest start, the family's land holdings progressively grew in size over the years, at one stage stretching from Sutton Rd to Bungendore Rd. As their landholdings increased, so too did the homestead. By 1916, the complex consisted of a four bedroom main house surrounded by a verandah, a skillion (extension), and a room mysteriously called the honey room. There was also a second house, a shed, stables, buggy shed, fowl house, brick oven, scullery, dairy, workshop, orchard and garden. The house even had a telephone, strung tree by tree by single wire over from Sutton Rd.

Following the establishment of the ACT (originally called the Federal Capital Territory) in 1910, the McInnes family's land holdings in Kowen, including eventually the homestead itself were, over time, resumed by the Commonwealth for plantation establishment.

In the late 1920s the homestead, now vacated by the McInnes family, was occupied by the original forestry overseer, Harold Tuson and his family, before becoming repurposed as accommodation for forestry workers with the establishment of the Kowen Forestry Settlement.

Unfortunately, due to a prolonged lack of maintenance, this important historical building was left to deteriorate and was subsequently bulldozed in 1979. Today, only the foundation stones of a single room remain.

However, the site lives on as a picnic ground with toilets, electric BBQs, and sheltered picnic tables. (Please note that drinking water is not available, so bring your own). The picnic ground can be booked for camping and is a venue for events such as the Canberra Sled Dog Club annual race, Queanbeyan scout camp-outs and an annual winter solstice rave party.oute description


Route Description:

Starting at <u>Bingley Way</u> (**A**), enter Kowen at the Bingley Way Horse Entrance (**B**) and turn right. Follow Wamboin Break west until you reach the second T intersection at the base of Poppet Hill (**C**). Turn left here and follow the road for 1.8 km to its end at a T intersection (with Welches Rd) (**D**). Turn right and in 150 m you will arrive at another intersection (with Poppet Rd) (**E**). Turn left and in 400 m you will arrive at the Old Homestead Picnic Ground (**F**). The return journey from Bingley way is 8 km.

2024 Wheels of Wamboin

When you are driving to Wheels of Wamboin on Saturday the 20th of April, you might wonder why most of you are driving a right hand drive (RHD) vehicle here in Australia when the US and Europe drive a left hand drive vehicle (LHD).

LHD is used in 165 countries and territories, mainly in the Americas, Europe, northern Africa and mainland Asia (except South Asia), while 75 countries use RHD, which account for about a about a third of the earths population (mostly former British Territories). In 1919, 104 of the world's territories were RHD and an equal number were LHD. Between 1919 and 1986, 34 of the RHD territories switched to LHD. So why the difference? There are a few theories but the one I like best goes back to medieval times and right hand knights.

Like today, most people in the time of knights were right handed so they would have held their swords in their right hand and carried them on the left side of their body. When meeting another person coming towards them on the road, it was natural to be on the left side of the path since that would allow them to offer a hand in greeting (yes you shake hands with your right hand) or defend themselves should they get attacked. It also kept their swords away from the passerby should they try to steal it. All knights were right handed as back in those days as being left handed was considered evil (therefore you didn't qualify to be a knight).

Since knights wore their swords on their left side, they would mount their horses from the left as well since that way the sword would not get in their way. It then made sense to place the horse against the left kerb so they would be able to mount their horses from the kerb, not the middle of the street. They must have had some traffic congestion back in those days as, in the year 1300, Pope Boniface VIII decreed that all pilgrims traveling to Rome should keep to the left.

So where did the left hand drive come from. The French of course, because they hated the English they did everything opposite. Napoleon was doing his marauding across much of Europe and he decreed that France would drive on the right just because he was a little nutso and wanted everything anti-British. Hence the US as well, after the war of Independence they took to the left as well.

The same goes for the military salute. The military salute was originally to raise your helmet visor to show the other knight your face so they could identify you when meeting on a road. Also, if your right hand was saluting you could not grab your sword which was on your left (remembering you're not evil if you're a knight), this also carried forward as a form of greeting as per the right hand handshake.
